## KVIS History

The Katonah Village Improvement Society (KVIS) is one of the oldest civic organizations in the country. Founded in 1878 to improve the conditions in Katonah, KVIS was responsible for planting 280 trees in barren “New Katonah,” which was established in 1897 when Old Katonah was threatened with submersion by the building of a dam and whose residents chose instead to preserve the village’s character and spirit by literally moving its families and homes to the village’s present-day site. KVIS not only improved the sanitary conditions in Katonah, but also enhanced the cultural landscape of the village by founding the Katonah Village Library, from which the Katonah Art Museum later evolved.

More than four generations since its inception, KVIS continues to be a vibrant, active organization whose activities strengthen Katonah’s unusually strong civic spirit. KVIS is dedicated to preserving the best from the past while improving the quality of village life in the present and for the future.

## Civic/Educational

- KVIS keeps its finger on the pulse of town activities, with representatives attending Town Board meetings and Community Organizations Committee meetings, and serving as active members on the Boards of the Katonah Chamber of Commerce and the Community Center.
- KVIS sponsors an annual Katonah Village Forum where residents meet town officials and ask questions in an informal setting.
- KVIS preserves Katonah’s history by printing and distributing Frances R. Duncombe’s book “Katonah, The History of a New York Village.”
- KVIS awards an annual college scholarship to a Katonah high school senior and an annual scholarship to KES fourth graders to attend the John Jay Homestead summer history camp.
- KVIS supports local civic and cultural institutions such as the Katonah Village Library, the Community Center, Family University and others.

## Cultural

- KVIS sponsors a free, annual outdoor film in downtown Katonah and professionally curates an on-going, monthly film series at the library
- KVIS collaborates with other Katonah cultural institutions, such as the Katonah Museum of Art to sponsor public art, the John Jay Homestead for scholarship/education and the Katonah Village Library to underwrite its poetry series.

## Beautification

- KVIS designed and custom built the Victorian-style bulletin board at the train station, and is responsible for its on-going upkeep.
- KVIS sponsors the annual Clean Up Day where nearly 100 bags of garbage are collected by kids and families in a fun, festive village spring cleaning.
- KVIS collaborated with the Town to install the attractive trash and recycling receptacles in the downtown area.
- KVIS donates plantings to public areas downtown.
